How to obtain a License
If you are an OSM Graduate, you will apply for a license by examination and have completed a
Washington State Board Approved Program. You must submit the following:
Completed application and fee
Complete the Washington State Jurisprudence Examination (online)
Complete an original school completion form.
 The form needs to be stamped and signed by the Registrar. At the time of graduation, the hours and length of the program must also match the board approved program.
Verification of all credentials that you hold or have previously held.
 You will need to request all US and foreign boards and jurisdictions where you have held professional license provide verification.
 Note: We will not accept a copy of your license.
Official examination score report from the National Certification Board for Therapeutic
Massage and Body Work (NCBTMB) or Federation of State Massage Therapy Boards
(FSMTB) must be submitted directly to the Department of Health.
CPR and First Aid Card
 Submit a photocopy, front and back, of your current Red Cross/First Aid Card and American Heart Association CPR card (or equivalent showing the expiration dates)
Signed Attestation on the application that you've completed the minimum of 4 hours of
education in the prevention, transmission and treatment of AIDS. There is a link for this

Criminal History Checks

Criminal history checks are conducted for all massage license applicants. If you answered yes to any of the personal data questions, please submit the appropriate supporting documentation as indicated on the application.

- The initial license will expire on your birthday unless the license is issued within 90 days of your next birthday. See WAC 246-12-020(3).
- You will receive a courtesy renewal notice if your license and address are kept up to date. Any renewal postmarked or given to the department after midnight on the expiration date is late.

Jurisprudence (Law) Examination

Massage & Bodywork Licensing Exam

To apply to take the MBLEx you will submit a completed application form online and fee payment. By submitting the completed application, you are acknowledging having reviewed the Examination Content Outline and has obtained education and training in the content subject areas.

Additionally, you will electronically sign an agreement to abide by and with the policies and procedures promulgated by FSMTB found in the MBLEx Candidate Handbook. This includes all policies regarding examination irregularities, cheating, and cancellation of scores.

Should you have any questions about the policies or procedures found in the Candidate Handbook, please contact the MBLEx office at your convenience.

Application Process

- 1. Application: You may apply online or by mail
 - FSMTB requires MBLEx applicants request transcripts to be sent directly to FSMTB by their massage therapy school. MBLEx applications are not complete for processing until educational records are received.
- Processing: Please allow five (5) business days for FSMTB to process your completed MBLEx application. A completed application consists of the MBLEx application, and your transcripts.
- 3. **Authorization to Test (ATT):** FSMTB sends an ATT to you via email with instructions to schedule your examination online or by calling toll free.
 - · You must test within 90 days of receiving an ATT.
- 4. **Confirmation**: Appointment confirmation is sent to you via email.
- Take MBLEx: You will receive unofficial exam results at the testing center and FSMTB sends your results to the designated state board or agency within 24 hours.

- If you have not received communication from FSMTB by the fifth day after submitting your application, please contact us at 1.866.962.3926 or email us at mblex@fsmtb.org.
- On the test day, you are required to bring two forms of identification to the test site. Please
 ensure the name on both of your identifications match the exact name provided on your
 application. For more information on appropriate forms of identification, please see the
 candidate handbook.

Taking the Exam

The MBLEx is administered on a daily basis, year-round at test sites across the United States. Once you are approved to test and receive an Authorization to Test (ATT) via your email, you will use that information to register for the exam date and testing location of your choice. For more information on finding the nearest test site to you, please visit Pearson VUE's website.

Candidates will have two hours to complete a 100-item, multiple choice examination on computer. Of this time, five minutes is allotted to a security and confidentiality agreement and five minutes to a brief survey. You should ensure you are aware of FSMTB security policies. See below.


